Our Aims

- 1. We support and empower families of children with children up to 18 through the provision of tailored information, 1-1 practical and emotional support from dedicated support workers and specialist resources.
- 2. We increase the confidence and selfmanagement skills of children & young people through our 2 virtual clubs: the High 5 Club (age 3-10) and XY Club (age 11+) as well as eczema workshops in their schools.



- 3. We break isolation by offering our families opportunities to meet and share experiences with a programme of large events in the UK, local meet-ups and a vibrant online community.
- 4. We encourage research and influence policy by being the voice of our members at national and international levels.
- 5. We improve understanding of the impact of eczema on life with the general public and healthcare professionals.

Why we exist

Atopic Eczema: more than a patch of dry skin...

Although eczema affects 1 in 5 children in the UK and is on the increase, its impact is vastly misunderstood by the general public.

Sadly, the reality for families living with the moderate to severe form of this chronic skin condition (about 20% of sufferers) is shaped by painful flares and constant itch, infections, time-consuming treatments, sleepless nights, days off school and work for parents, low confidence and breakdowns. It can also lead to social isolation.



Eczema is associated with other atopic diseases, such as asthma, allergies and hay-fever, worsening the burden of the disease.



Studies show that a fifth of children with eczema are bullied at school and 1 in 2 has low self-esteem; there is a sense of desperation and frustration in families with skin disease.

1 in 5 mothers feel like a failure due to eczema; sleep deprivation is linked to anxiety and increased risks of depression.

There is no cure for eczema.

Eczema can only be managed with treatments and support.



1. Personalised Support

This year, we welcomed 364 new families, making a total of 1,396 families supported by the charity since its launch in 2011.





Out of these 364 families, over a third (139) were signposted to us from their healthcare professional, primarily their dermatologist, GP, health visitor and dermatology Nurse.




Each family received a personalised welcome pack filled with evidence-based information on eczema and its treatments, self-management resources, other families' stories and an eczema related gift for the child.

Our team of Family Support Workers carried out 176 baseline calls during which they discussed all aspects of life impacted by eczema, ensure treatments were understood, shared practical tips and provided emotional support. 127 of these required Ongoing Support, including regular calls, guidance, advocacy meetings and on occasion home visits.

In order to reach families from Wales and diverse ethnic backgrounds, we also translated some of our main materials into Welsh, Polish, Arabic and Mandarin. Some interactions with families have required the help of interpreters.



2. Our children's activities

This year, we welcomed 419 new children, including 222 children aged 3-17 who joined our two virtual clubs. We now support 1,511 children and young people with eczema in the UK.

A total of 237 teens and young people aged 11+ are now part of our XY Club. Throughout the year a group of our young people have worked with us to develop new resources for the XY Club including an app and a new booklet to launch in 2019. The project has involved consultation sessions, events and 1-1 work.

We also worked alongside the Mental Health Foundation in 2018 so they were able to develop and deliver a 'Stress Less' programme for our young people with eczema. The participants benefited from a great opportunity to meet others with the condition and learn valuable self-management skills.




My child with eczema...

3. Connecting Families

Our 3 Learn & Share events welcomed a total of over 250 participants and included talks from healthcare professionals, self-management activities for children and the opportunity to meet other families with eczema.

- Storytelling Centre in Edinburgh on the 1st September 2018
- Glasgow Science Centre on the 10th November 2018
- Edinburgh City Arts Centre on the 16th March 2019

This year we developed a suite of **new workshop activities** funded by the Curiosity Fund to engage children with their condition. The fun hands-on activities were rolled out at two of our events and were a huge success.

Over 690 members are now part of our **closed Facebook group**, sharing tips and support eachother at any time of the day, from anywhere in the UK.

Outreach Education

School workshops

Our Outreach Worker delivered 42 eczema awareness workshops in 24 Scottish schools from 12 local authorities, reaching over 1,057 children.

Eczema sessions with education and healthcare professionals

Additionally, we ran sessions for primary school staff, a nursery staff team, and 7 health visitor teams across 3 Local Authorities.

The school workshops can have a big impact for the child with eczema:

• **HOME**: We participated in the harmonisation of eczema instruments (VI) in Utrecht, May 2018

HOME is a global initiative of patients, healthcare professionals, journal editors, regulatory authorities and the pharmaceutical industry. It exists to develop a consensus-based core outcome set (COS) for clinical trials and clinical practice. The core outcome set is the MINIMUM that should be measured in ALL clinical trials.



 We attended the Pre-EADV meeting in Paris organised by the International Society of Atopic Dermatitis (ISAD) and shared ideas with l'association Francaise de l'eczema (France), the National Eczema Association (USA), the Eczema Society of Canada and industry representative in Sept 2019, Paris.

Research Steering Groups

EOS is a patient group representative on various research steering groups: UK Trend (translational eczema research), A-STAR Registry (UK/Irish eczema research in systemic treatments), BIOMAP (international research project in eczema and psoriasis). We are a member of the UK Dermatology Clinical Trials Network (Centre of Evidence Based Dermatology, Nottingham).

Annual Accounts

2018/2019



Financial Review

The majority of our income, £272,564 in the year to 31st March 2019 (2018: £210,853) came from grants. This was complemented by generous donations from individuals much of which was raised by members holding fundraising events.

Our expenditure during the year increased from £203,714 in 2018 to £227,843 in 2019.

The Charity had a surplus this year of £48,589 compared to a surplus last year of £7,139.

The result of the income and expenditure figures given above was that the charity had a balance of funds at the year end of £132,434 (2018: £83,845). £70,632 of this balance (2018: £29,527) was held as restricted funds – made up of a variety of different grants provided for specific purposes, as detailed in Note 11.

Reserves policy

Introduction

EOS is primarily dependent on restricted income from trusts and foundations, which means that income can fluctuate. In order to protect EOS members and staff from sudden major changes in the service provided it is considered prudent to have some financial reserves to bridge any short term funding gaps or to ensure EOS can be closed in an orderly manner.

Reserves to be held

The aim should be to hold unrestricted reserves equivalent to at least 25% of the planned expenditure in any current financial year.

This should allow several options if a funding shortfall occurs, while also ensuring there is money for any contract and/or redundancy payments due.

Setting amount of Reserves

At the beginning of every financial year (April) once the annual budget has been agreed the amount aimed to be kept in reserves will be set.

Spending of Reserves

Should the situation arise where the reserves are required the Board and the CEO will decide how best to spend the reserves (e.g. staffing and activity levels) depending on the circumstances.

Review

This policy will be reviewed at least every 2 years.

At the year end the Charity holds £132,434 (2018: £83,845) in reserves of which £61,802 is unrestricted and of this, free reserves not invested in fixed assets amount to £61,802. No material amounts have been designated. The funds held at the year end place the charity in a strong position to commence the next financial year. As with most charities the Charity constantly needs to seek new sources of funding in order for the work to continue.

Going concern

The directors are not aware of any circumstances which would lead to the winding up of the Charity and thus are confident in its status as a going concern.

Notes to the Accounts

For the year ended 31st March 2019

1 Accounting policies

The following accounting policies have been applied consistently in dealing with items which are considered material and significant in relation to the company's financial statements.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis in accordance with applicable accounting standards and under the historical cost convention. The charity is a public benefit entity and a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation with the registered office as noted on page 15. The financial statements are compliant with the charity's constitution, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) FRS 102 "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (revised 2017), and in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102).

Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, when it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably. Donations, grants and similar incoming resources are included in the year in which they are receivable, which is when the charity becomes entitled to the resource. Other trading income includes consultancy and research fees, which are recognised when the charity has delivered the service and is therefore entitled to the income.

Income that relates to a future period as a result of donor imposed conditions specifying the time period in which it must be used, is treated as deferred income.

Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure. The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly costs are shown gross of irrecoverable VAT. Where directly attributable, expenditure is allocated to the relevant functional category.

Expenditure on raising funds includes costs associated with generating income for the charity, either through fundraising initiatives or research projects. Expenditure on charitable activities includes costs incurred in supporting the charity and its objectives as set out in the trustees' report.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Expenditure (continued)

Support costs are allocated between governance costs and other support costs. Governance costs comprise those costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulations and good practice. They therefore include the costs of the independent examination, together with the costs of trustees' meeting and some staff costs. Other support costs relate to the administrative costs of running the charity and are allocated to charitable activities accordingly.

Fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Assets below £500 are not capitalised but are expensed in the year they are incurred. Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Office equipment

25% straight line

Furniture and fittings

25% straight line

Debtors

Other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in a transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity, without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds are those funds which are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

Pensions

The charity contributes to employees' individual pension plans. The amounts charged in the Statement of Financial Activities represent the contributions to the defined contribution scheme and to individual pension plans in respect of the accounting period.
